Mom said, "No! You are terrific! I'll tell you why they want to meet us......"





When she was pregnant with me, she and my dad went to see a doctor who helps make certain that babies are born healthy. They all wanted to take good care of me!







My mom said the doctor said I looked great.

The doctor introduced my parents to a geneticist. He asked questions about our family. He explained how we all have genes inside our cells.


He said, all babies have a combination of their parents' genes. I would be a little like my father and a little like my mother.

He said that looking at my genes would not tell them many things. He joked that – for example - he would not be able to tell if I would like pizza.


Dad said he was sure I would!

I wondered what they would want to know?




Maybe they want to know if I like pizza!

THE RULES


- WE WILL DO DIFFERENT THINGS LIKE

 - SOME WILL BE A CHALLENGE.




- NOBODY DOES!


Just as she said, there were some things that were easy-peasy!




And just as she said, there were some challenging things!




There were school things.




And there were some unexpected things




There were times when I just had to listen and respond
